Safe - Keep your personal information safe. When chatting or posting online don't give away things like your full name, password or home address.



Meet - If someone who you don't know ever asks you to meet up, say no and report it.



Accepting - Do not accept something if you are unsure of who the person is or what they've sent you.



Reliable - You cannot trust everything you see online as some things can be out of date, inaccurate or not entirely true.



Tell - Tell a trusted adult if something or someone ever makes you feel upset, worried or confused.
